



COURSE DETAILS

MOA 155—MEDICAL TERMINOLOGY. Offered in Fall (Sept-Dec) & Winter (Jan—Apr) terms

- ◆ *Course Description:* This course will provide students with an understanding of medical terminology through the development of the necessary language skills to define, pronounce and correctly spell medical terms and includes related physiology and anatomy.
- ◆ Fully online. Asynchronous Delivery
- ◆ Pre-Requisite = C in Eng 12. Co-Req is fine
- ◆ MOA 155 is a required prerequisite course to apply to the Certified Medical Lab Assistant, Medical Radiography & Sonography programs, and is part of the Medical Office Assistant program

MLAB 139—PRE-ANALYTICS & LABORATORY PRINCIPLES. Offered in Fall (Sept-Dec) & Winter (Jan—Apr) terms

- ◆ *Course Description:* In this course, students examine the function and safe operation of laboratory and accessory analytical equipment found in the medical laboratory environment. Students explore technical and biological principles affecting the preparation and quality of samples. By focusing on chemical analysis and reagents, students will learn how and why blood products and other samples are collected, labelled, prepared, handled, stored, packaged and transported in the pre-analytical phase.
- ◆ Blended Delivery. Online Asynchronous Lectures + On-Campus Labs every Friday 3:00—5:50pm
- ◆ Co-Requisite = A&P12
- ◆ MLAB 139 is a part of the Certified Medical Lab Assistant program

PNUR 101—ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY. Offered in Winter term (Jan—Apr)

- ◆ *Course Description:* This course is an introduction to the human body. Learners explore the structure and function of main organ systems and discuss health promotion strategies to support optimal function of each system. The terminology of human anatomy and physiology will be stressed
- ◆ Fully online. Synchronous Delivery
- ◆ Pre-Requisite = C in A&P 12. Students must take A&P 12 in Semester 1. Please reach out to Colin.
- ◆ PNUR 101 is a required prerequisite course to apply for the LPN diploma program

HEALTH 111—INDIGENOUS PEOPLE'S HEALTH. Offered in Winter term (Jan—Apr)

- ◆ *Course Description:* Students will explore indigenous peoples' health experiences: past, present, and future. Using a strength-based and holistic perspective, students will learn about the current realities of Indigenous peoples' health experiences, and will be introduced to traditional healing practices. Students will be able to use this knowledge to further their own understanding of Indigenous peoples' health, and can apply this experience to work with children, families and in community.
- ◆ Fully online. Synchronous Delivery
- ◆ Pre-Requisite = C in Eng 12. Students must take Eng 12 in Semester 1 (or assessment). Please reach out to Colin.
