xʷməθkʷə́yəm: Land Beneath Our Feet

We would like to begin by acknowledging that the land on which we gather, work and learn upon is the unceded territory of the Coast Salish Peoples, including the territories of the xʷməθkʷə́y əm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), Stó:lō and Səl'ílwətaʔ/Selilwitulh (Tsleil- Waututh) Nations. The land has always been a place of learning for the Indigenous peoples, who for millennia have passed on their culture, history, and traditions from one generation to the next. Unceded means that this land was never surrendered, relinquished or handed over in any way.

Land acknowledgment is a part of reconciliation, and as such we give you all the responsibility to continue your self-education by asking questions and learning more about reconciliation. Questions like: What can you do to better care for the land? And Who lived on this land before you?

Land acknowledgment is about reflecting on the places where we reside and work and play, while respecting all peoples and their experiences, but in recognition of the Indigenous traditions and ties to the land.

Land acknowledgment can help build understanding about our relationships and responsibilities to the Indigenous people and lands where we live and work. It is a living celebration of Indigenous communities and relationships, and appreciation for the rich history and culture of the lands where we live and work.

We also invite you all to research what traditional lands you live, work and play in so that you can in your own way give acknowledgment.








Public Health Dietitian in Population Health with Interior Health
UBC | Land and Food Systems, Dietetics

Seamus is a member of the Oneida Nation of the Thames (Turtle Clan, with relational ties to the Ninham and Powless families) and has Czech, Swedish, and Irish ancestry. He was born in Cranbrook, BC, grew up in Terrace, BC, and now lives on the unceded ʔamakʔis Ktunaxa territory. He studied at UBC and did a 10-month placement at the College of the Rockies.



Carmela de Gracia-Patten (she/her)
Kinesiologist in Primary Care
BSc Kinesiology from UVic 17' | MKIN from UBC 22'

Carmela is from Nanaimo, BC, and is a Practicing Kinesiologist based in Terrace, BC. She is the first Kinesiologist in British Columbia working within a Public Primary Care setting, where she supports interdisciplinary, community-based care.

UBC Faculty of Medicine MD Undergraduate Program





NETWORKING TIPS

How to Make the Most of Your Time with Program Representatives

Ask about rural-focused opportunities

All attending programs want to recruit rural students. Ask about what each program offers to attract and support rural students. In your application, you can reference these opportunities to demonstrate your commitment to rural healthcare and show that you've done your homework.

Explore pathways and financial support

Ask about opportunities, pathways, and financial aid specifically for rural students or for those interested in working in rural communities after graduation.

Learn about rural study experiences

Many programs offer practicums, rotations, or other experiential learning opportunities in rural communities. Ask what options are available and how to take advantage of them.

Find out about support for transitioning students

Ask what supports are available to help rural students adjust to a new environment. This is your chance to get personalized advice about applications and student life.

Ask what they look for in applicants

Find out the skills, experiences, and personality traits that fit their program. This insight can help you tailor your application.

Address your weaknesses

Be honest about areas where your application may be weaker, such as grades or extracurricular experience, and ask for advice on improvement. Programs may suggest academic upgrading, volunteering, joining clubs, or framing your personal statement strategically.

Focus your questions wisely & do your homework

Avoid asking for information available on program websites. Each booth provides a website link where you can access detailed information. Come prepared with questions about admissions requirements specific to your situation, such as course eligibility, pathways, or scholarships to get meaningful, personalized answers.


